Magritte began to integrate text into some of his works, and during this time he painted one of his most famous pieces, The Treachery of Images (1929), in which a detailed representation of a pipe is combined with the cursive statement: Ceci n' est pas une pipe (" This is not a pipe "). In Foucault on Painting, Catherine M. Soussloff argues that Foucault ' s sustained engagement with European art history critically addresses present concerns about the mediated nature of the image in the digital age.
